# COLLABORATION

## Coalition Project

*Our coalition in Cambodia works toward collective impact against trafficking and abuse by raising standards of care, promoting best practices, and providing members with opportunities for collaboration, mentoring, and training. This year we:*

- ✓ Provided training for **280 member staff participants** on mental health, organizational development, child participation, human trafficking and human rights.
- ✓ Facilitated **focus forums** for caregivers, expats, on human resources, and financial management with **140 participants**.
- ✓ Hosted **549 member staff** at our bi-annual member meetings in Phnom Penh, and **44 member staff** at member meetings in the provinces
- ✓ Expanded our member resource library by **85 new resources**. **72 individuals** borrowed various resources from our library.
- ✓ Lead our first Caregiver Retreat with **22 members** joining for a few days of staff care.





## **Butterfly Longitudinal Research Project**

Our Butterfly Research Project is a 10-year longitudinal study examining the reintegration of sex trafficking survivors in Cambodia. The objective is to understand reintegration from the perspective of survivors themselves. 2017 completed our 8th year of research and:

- ✓ Presented research at 2 conferences.
- ✓ Distributed 236 copies of butterfly research to partners and stakeholders.

## **Siobhan Miles**

Siobhan was instrumental in the founding of our Butterfly Research Project. With her unexpected passing we dedicated our library after her, honoring her commitment, perseverance and legacy of the Butterfly research. So the voices of survivors who, through this research, are able to have their experiences, hopes, fears and opinions shared not only in Cambodia but around the world. Furthering the understanding of those working with them and advocating for them and creating a better future for others at risk and exploited.

# PREVENTION



## Safe Communities

*Trains community leaders across Cambodia, empowering them to protect their community from trafficking, abuse and exploitation. This year we:*

- ✓ **15,000 Help Cards** were distributed throughout the year.
- ✓ Organized **20 live radio shows, broadcasted 200 times** and facilitated **Q&A radio programs with 50 callers** on trafficking, sexual abuse, safe migration and forced marriage.
- ✓ Community forums were started to engage the villages in the discussion of trafficking.

## Ethnic Community Prevention

*Empowers ethnic minority communities in Cambodia to protect those at risk of sexual abuse and trafficking. This year we:*

- ✓ Conducted bilingual training on trafficking, sexual abuse and safe migration with **1899 community members**
- ✓ 45 families participated in workshops on **parenting skills**.
- ✓ Maintained positive relationships with **39 community leaders** in communities.



## Community Heroes

*Preventing trafficking in rural areas of Cambodia by empowering and encouraging volunteer trainers (heroes) to protect their communities. This year we:*

- ✓ Provided ongoing support for **114 community heroes**, including providing them with **39,100 leaflets**, **13 poster flip charts**, new bags and t-shirts, new books on trafficking and migration
- ✓ **88%** of cases reported to heroes were responded to correctly.
- ✓ Heroes reached **12,170 people in 267 villages in 5 districts** with education on safe migration, trafficking, and child rights.
- ✓ **16 cases** came to Chab Dai directly from community heroes.

## Case Support Project

*Provides hotline, legal and referral support for local and international victims of trafficking, and abuse.*

*This year we:*

- ✓ Provided local case support and referrals for **129 trafficking** and **51 rape cases**.
- ✓ Responded to **63 cases** from China
- ✓ Supported **54 flights for repatriation** of victims
- ✓ Achieved **22 convictions**.

## Community Based Client Care

*Support for Cambodian social workers and counselors working with survivors in the community. This year we:*

- ✓ Provided social services for **21 new cases**, with a minimum of **4 follow up sessions**.
- ✓ Provided a total of **138 counseling sessions**.
- ✓ Cooperated with **45 local authorities** for victims.
- ✓ Organized social work conference, with **158 participants**, from **31 organizations** in Cambodia.
- ✓ Provided **transportation, food and additional supplies** to families, in addition to **77 total counseling sessions**.
- ✓ Support clients with counseling for an average of 2 years.

## Legal Support Project

*Provides free legal support for victims of trafficking, and abuse. This year we:*

- ✓ Provided legal consultations for **24 victims and 72 family members**.
- ✓ Represented 12 clients in court leading to **12 convictions** with **4 cases** already receiving compensation.



## Advocacy Project

*Advocacy Project works with local police, the community, Cambodian and regional governments, and other stakeholders to strengthen their practice of child rights. Advocacy Project strives to see that children will be protected from exploitation and child victims and their families will be given protection and access to justice. This year we:*

- ✓ Completed a training with **63 police officers** from Svay Reing and Prey Veng.
- ✓ Trained **42 police officers, 16 commune council officials, 1 deputy district official, and 3 officials** from the ministry of social affairs on child friendly procedures when interviewing victims.



## Global Learning Community

*Global Learning Community (GLC) works to raise the standards of care for vulnerable populations and survivors of trafficking and exploitation. We do this through connecting stakeholders, building the capacity of partners, increasing collaboration and sharing of ideas and knowledge. We engage diverse stakeholders, recognizing that these issues can only be addressed through the engagement of multiple sectors. This year we:*

- ✓ Assisted **30 partners in 15 countries**
- ✓ Attended conferences and shared information on human trafficking in Berlin, Chiang Mai, Hong Kong, Stanford, Belfast, India, New York, and London.
- ✓ Hosted and organized our first Asia Region Anti-Trafficking Conference in Bangkok, Thailand.



## Asia Region Anti-Trafficking Conference



*The Asia Region Anti-Trafficking (ARAT) Conference is the natural progression of the work done by Stop the Traffik Australia and Chab Dai Coalition. Collaboration is a key part of how we work and we aimed to support and facilitate partnerships during this event.*

- ✓ Around **200 attendees** from **19 countries**.
- ✓ **27 keynote speakers and facilitators** lead discussions on best practices in anti-human trafficking.
- ✓ Attendees gathered together by their country groups to discuss plans on collaboration moving forward.

***“As a result of great networking opportunities from the ARAT Conference, Global Family Care Network had connected with several organizations based in Cambodia. When invited to visit Cambodia to demonstrate our children’s club program, we decided to pursue expansion opportunities to translate our curriculum into Khmer in 2018! These conversations all started at ARAT, and it’s great to see how willing and open we all can be to share our resources, experience and help each other in the future.”***


